### **Stewardship reflection for this week.**

I was with my father at a football match. As the new signing was easily dispossessed yet again, the man in front turned in his seat and said, “I don’t care if they paid nothing for him; he’s not worth it!”

How do you assess what someone is ‘worth’? Both Hagar and Ishmael, and Jeremiah, in their own ways, have their value questioned; and are affirmed by God. In our Epistle, Paul states that our value is given by our baptism into Christ’s death. And the words Jesus in Matthew’s Gospel proclaim a world in which the ordinary concepts of ‘value’, of ‘precedence’, are turned upside down by the values of the kingdom.

Taking up your cross’ is not an image that strikes an immediate chord with us, as it would have done with Jesus’ first hearers. Perhaps the nearest parallel would be an invitation to become a Palestinian suicide bomber, sacrificing oneself with no hope of escape.

#### Concert by the Loveny Male Voice Choir

The Loveny Male Voice Choir was founded in 1971 in the village of St  
Neot in Cornwall and named after the River Loveny, which flows  
through the village. It gave its first concert the following year at  
Bolventor Chapel, close to Jamaica Inn on Bodmin Moor. Since then it  
has gained an enviable reputation in Devon and Cornwall and has been  
on tour to Wales, Brittany, Germany, the Netherlands, Malta and the  
Czech Republic.

The choir is directed by Richard Braebrook, a Yorkshire-born Tenor who  
was for many years a principal singer with the D'Oyly Carte Opera  
Company and later a cast member of *The Phantom of the Opera* in  
London's West End.

The Loveny Male Voice Choir is on tour in Cambridgeshire from 11 to 14  
July 2014, including visits to St Neots Parish Church and All Saints, St  
Ives.

this is my blood of the new covenant,  
which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.  
Do this, as often as you drink it,  
in remembrance of me.
